FACE MASKS REQUIRED UPON ENTRY AND WHILE IN COMMON AREAS OF CITY FACILITIES

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020, an emergency proclamation was issued by the Mayor of the City of Branson in accordance with Chapter 34 of the Branson Municipal Code and Chapter 44 of the Missouri Revised Statutes in response to life health and safety risk to the citizens of Branson as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, Taney County has seen a 638% increase from thirteen (13) positive COVID-19 cases on June 6th to ninety-six (96) positive COVID-19 cases on July 6th; and

WHEREAS, Branson Municipal Code Sec. 34-35 authorizes the City Administrator and Emergency Management Director to “promulgate orders, rules and regulations ... to ensure the protection of life and property”; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED UNDER THE EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 34, ARTICLE II OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE CITY OF BRANSON, MISSOURI, THAT BEGINNING JULY 8, 2020 THE FOLLOWING ORDER SHALL BE IN EFFECT:

All individuals older than twelve years of age are required to wear a face mask upon entering and while in the public common areas of all City of Branson government facilities unless that individual is engaged in a recreational activity or has a medical condition or disability that prevents wearing a face mask.

As used above the term “face mask” means a particulate mask or fabric covering of the nose and mouth secured to the face with ties or loops that is covering the nose and mouth.

As used above the term “recreational activity” means any physical exercise activity, active participation in any team sport, or swimming in a swimming pool.

This Order remains in effect until further order of the Emergency Management Director, City Administrator or ordinance of the Board of Alderman.

STAFF REPORT

ITEM/SUBJECT: READING OF A BILL AMENDING CHAPTER 58 OF THE BRANSON MUNICIPAL CODE PERTAINING TO FACE COVERINGS, PUBLIC SPACES AND THE SPREAD OF COMMUNICABLE DISEASES.

INITIATED BY: EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DIRECTOR | LEGAL DEPARTMENT

FIRST READING: JULY 16, 2020

FINAL READING: JULY 28, 2020

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

- This ordinance is designed to follow the recommendations of the CDC and our local health department by mandating face coverings and signage requirements for business operating within the City limits.
- On June 11, 2020, Governor Michael Parson announced through a press release that the State of Missouri would “fully reopen” and “there will be no statewide health order” in place and stated further that “[a]ll statewide restrictions will be lifted, though local officials will still have the authority to put further rules, regulations, or ordinances in place.”
- COVID-19 has spread rapidly amongst the population of Missouri with twenty-seven thousand four hundred and forty-three (27,443) reported cases and one thousand sixty-nine (1,069) deaths as of 2pm on Sunday, July 12, 2020.
- Taney County has seen a 846% increase from thirteen (13) positive COVID-19 cases on June 6th to one-hundred and twenty-three (123) positive COVID-19 cases as of 2pm on Sunday, July 12, 2020.
- The authority for this ordinance is laid out in Section 79.380, RSMo which permits the Board of Aldermen to “make regulations and pass ordinances for the prevention of the introduction of contagious diseases in the city, and for the abatement of the same, and may make quarantine laws and enforce the same within five miles of the city.”
- This ordinance has the following components:
 - Requires individuals to wear face coverings while in indoor and outdoor public spaces unless they are engaged in certain activities or under the age of thirteen (13).
 - Requires operators of public places to ensure guests use face coverings.
 - Requires signage at all businesses outlining requirements on social distancing and face coverings.
 - Penalty for violating is a \$100 fine and potential revocation of business license and other permits.
- This ordinance will go into effect at 12:01 AM on July 20, 2020 and remain in effect until 11:59 PM, August 20, 2020 unless extended by the Emergency Management Director and City Administrator under authority granted by the Board of Aldermen.
- Staff is requesting a double read on this item.

UPDATE (JULY 23, 2020):

- This item was postponed during its First Reading at the July 16, 2020 Regular Board of Aldermen meeting. It has a motion and second on the floor to call for the vote on Bill No. 5837 as amended and is currently in need of a vote on that motion. If approved, then a vote will be taken on the motion to approve the First Reading of the bill as amended, which that motion is currently on the floor also.
- Taney County has seen cases of COVID-19 increase from one-hundred and twenty-three (123) positive cases on Sunday July 12, 2020 to one-hundred and seventy-seven (177) positive cases as of 2:00 PM on July 22, 2020.
- The State of Missouri has seen an increase of twenty-seven thousand four hundred and forty-three (27,443) reported positive COVID-19 cases and one thousand sixty-nine (1,069) deaths related to COVID-19 as of 2pm on Sunday, July 12, 2020 to thirty-six thousand and sixty-three (36,063) reported positive COVID-19 cases and one-thousand one hundred and fifty nine (1,159) deaths related to COVID-19 as of 2pm on July 22, 2020.
- The Centers for Disease Prevention and Control on July 17, 2020 released a report regarding exposure at the Great Clips Salon in Springfield, Missouri. The report below provided additional real world data supporting and confirming the science behind the effectiveness of face coverings:

- After significant feedback from the community regarding face coverings, staff is recommending the following additional amendments:
Line 105: Remove “consuming food, drink, or smoking” as this will allow any person in a public space such as a theater or concert venue that is seated and properly socially distanced from others to remove their mask.
Line 180 change “July 20, 2020” to “July 31, 2020” as the effective date of the original ordinance has passed.
Line 182: change “August 20, 2020” to “September 8, 2020” so that the expiration date of the ordinance coincides with the first scheduled regular Board of Aldermen meeting in September.

Know how it spreads

- There is currently no vaccine to prevent coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19).
- **The best way to prevent illness is to avoid being exposed to this virus.**
- The virus is thought to **spread mainly from person-to-person**.
 - Between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet).
 - Through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs, sneezes or talks.
 - These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs.
 - Some recent studies have suggested that COVID-19 may be spread by people who are not showing symptoms.

Everyone Should



Wash your hands often

- **Wash your hands** often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds especially after you have been in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing.
- If soap and water are not readily available, **use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol**. Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry.
- **Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth** with unwashed hands.





Avoid close contact

- **Avoid close contact** with people who are sick
- **Stay home as much as possible.**   | [Español  ]
- Put **distance between yourself and other people.**
 - Remember that some people without symptoms may be able to spread virus.
 - Keeping distance from others is especially important for **people who are at higher risk of getting very sick.**



Cover your mouth and nose with a cloth face cover when around others

- You could spread COVID-19 to others even if you do not feel sick.
- Everyone should wear a **cloth face cover** when they have to go out in public, for example to the grocery store or to pick up other necessities.
 - Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance.
- The cloth face cover is meant to protect other people in case you are infected.
- Do NOT use a facemask meant for a healthcare worker.
- Continue to keep about 6 feet between yourself and others. The cloth face cover is not a substitute for social distancing.



Cover coughs and sneezes

- **If you are in a private setting and do not have on your cloth face covering, remember to always cover your mouth and nose** with a tissue when you cough or sneeze or use the inside of your elbow.
- **Throw used tissues** in the trash.
- Immediately **wash your hands** with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not readily available, clean your hands with a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.



Clean and disinfect

- **Clean AND disinfect frequently touched surfaces daily.** This includes tables, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, desks, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, and sinks.
- **If surfaces are dirty, clean them.** Use detergent or soap and water prior to disinfection.
- **Then, use a household disinfectant.** Most common [EPA-registered household disinfectants](#) [↗](#) will work.

Use of Cloth Face Coverings to Help Slow the Spread of COVID-19

How to Wear Cloth Face Coverings

Cloth face coverings should—

- fit snugly but comfortably against the side of the face
- be secured with ties or ear loops
- include multiple layers of fabric
- allow for breathing without restriction
- be able to be laundered and machine dried without damage or change to shape

CDC on Homemade Cloth Face Coverings

CDC recommends wearing cloth face coverings in public settings where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain (e.g., grocery stores and pharmacies), **especially** in areas of significant community-based transmission.

CDC also advises the use of simple cloth face coverings to slow the spread of the virus and help people who may have the virus and do not know it from transmitting it to others. Cloth face coverings fashioned from household items or made at home from common materials at low cost can be used as an additional, voluntary public health measure.

Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the cloth face covering without assistance.

The cloth face coverings recommended are not surgical masks or N-95 respirators. Those are critical supplies that must continue to be reserved for healthcare workers and other medical first responders, as recommended by current CDC guidance.

Should cloth face coverings be washed or otherwise cleaned regularly? How regularly?


Yes. They should be routinely washed depending on the frequency of use.

How does one safely sterilize/clean a cloth face covering?

A washing machine should suffice in properly washing a cloth face covering.

How does one safely remove a used cloth face covering?


Individuals should be careful not to touch their eyes, nose, and mouth when removing their cloth face covering and wash hands immediately after removing.



Sewn Cloth Face Covering


Materials

- Two 10"x6" rectangles of cotton fabric
- Two 6" pieces of elastic (or rubber bands, string, cloth strips, or hair ties)
- Needle and thread (or bobby pin)
- Scissors
- Sewing machine




Tutorial


1. Cut out two 10-by-6-inch rectangles of cotton fabric. Use tightly woven cotton, such as quilting fabric or cotton sheets. T-shirt fabric will work in a pinch. Stack the two rectangles; you will sew the cloth face covering as if it was a single piece of fabric.




2. Fold over the long sides $\frac{1}{4}$ inch and hem. Then fold the double layer of fabric over $\frac{1}{2}$ inch along the short sides and stitch down.



3. Run a 6-inch length of $\frac{1}{8}$ -inch wide elastic through the wider hem on each side of the cloth face covering. These will be the ear loops. Use a large needle or a bobby pin to thread it through. Tie the ends tight. Don't have elastic? Use hair ties or elastic head bands. If you only have string, you can make the ties longer and tie the cloth face covering behind your head.



4. Gently pull on the elastic so that the knots are tucked inside the hem. Gather the sides of the cloth face covering on the elastic and adjust so the mask fits your face. Then securely stitch the elastic in place to keep it from slipping.




Quick Cut T-shirt Cloth Face Covering (no sew method)




Bandana Cloth Face Covering (no sew method)



WEAR YOUR FACE COVERING CORRECTLY

- Wash your hands before putting on your face covering
- Put it over your nose and mouth and secure it under your chin
- Try to fit it snugly against the sides of your face
- Make sure you can breathe easily
- Do not place a mask on a child younger than 2



USE THE FACE COVERING TO HELP PROTECT OTHERS

- Wear cloth face coverings in public settings and when around people who don't live in your household, especially when other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain
- Don't put the covering around your neck or up on your forehead
- Don't touch the face covering, and, if you do, clean your hands

FOLLOW EVERYDAY HEALTH HABITS

- Stay at least 6 feet away from others
- Avoid contact with people who are sick
- Wash your hands often, with soap and water, for at least 20 seconds each time
- Use hand sanitizer if soap and water are not available



TAKE OFF YOUR CLOTH FACE COVERING CAREFULLY, WHEN YOU'RE HOME

- Untie the strings behind your head or stretch the ear loops
- Handle only by the ear loops or ties
- Fold outside corners together
- Place covering in the washing machine
- Wash your hands with soap and water



Cloth face coverings are not surgical masks or N-95 respirators, both of which should be saved for health care workers and other medical first responders.

How to Wash Cloth Face Coverings

Cloth face coverings are an additional step to help slow the spread of COVID-19 when combined with **every day preventive actions** and **social distancing** in public settings.

Cloth face coverings should be washed after each use. It is important to always **remove face coverings correctly** and **wash your hands** after handling or touching a used face covering.

How to clean

Washing machine

- You can include your face covering with your regular laundry.
- Use regular laundry detergent and the warmest appropriate water setting for the cloth used to make the face covering.



Washing by hand

- Prepare a bleach solution by mixing:
 - 5 tablespoons (1/3rd cup) household bleach per gallon of room temperature water or
 - 4 teaspoons household bleach per quart of room temperature water
- Check the label to see if your bleach is intended for disinfection. Some bleach products, such as those designed for safe use on colored clothing, may not be suitable for disinfection. Ensure the bleach product is not past its expiration date. Never mix household bleach with ammonia or any other cleanser.
- Soak the face covering in the bleach solution for 5 minutes.
- Rinse thoroughly with cool or room temperature water.



Make sure to completely dry cloth face covering after washing.

How to dry

Dryer

- Use the highest heat setting and leave in the dryer until completely dry.



Air dry

- Lay flat and allow to completely dry. If possible, place the cloth face covering in direct sunlight.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 58 OF THE BRANSON MUNICIPAL CODE PERTAINING TO FACE COVERINGS, PUBLIC SPACES AND THE SPREAD OF COMMUNICABLE DISEASES.

WHEREAS, In December 2019, a new coronavirus known as SARS-CoV-2 was first detected in Wuhan, Hubei Province, People’s Republic of China, causing outbreaks of the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) that has now spread globally and into the United States; and

WHEREAS, COVID-19 is spread between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet) or through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes and as such presents an imminent threat of widespread illness and even death in some cases; and

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization characterized COVID-19 as a pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, President Donald Trump, under the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, including sections 201 and 301 of the National Emergencies Act (50 U.S.C. 1601 et seq.) and consistent with section 1135 of the Social Security Act (SSA), as amended (42 U.S.C. 1320b-5), found and proclaimed that that the COVID-19 outbreak in the United States constitutes a national emergency; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, Governor Michael Parson, signed Executive Order 20-02 declaring a state of emergency in the State of Missouri in response to COVID-19 and that state of emergency has been extended under Executive Order 20-12 to December 31, 2020; and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020, an emergency proclamation was issued by the Mayor of the City of Branson in accordance with Chapter 34 of the Branson Municipal Code and Chapter 44 of the Missouri Revised Statutes in response to life health and safety risk to the citizens of Branson as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, Governor Michael Parson announced through a press release on June 11, 2020 that the State of Missouri would “fully reopen” and “there will be no statewide health order” in place; and

WHEREAS, COVID-19 has spread rapidly amongst the population of Missouri with twenty-seven thousand four hundred and forty-three (27,443) reported cases and one thousand sixty-nine (1,069) deaths as of 2pm on Sunday, July 12, 2020; and

52 WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen “may make regulations and pass ordinances for the prevention of the
53 introduction of contagious diseases in the city, and for the abatement of the same, and may make quarantine
54 laws and enforce the same within five miles of the city” under Section 78.380 of the Missouri Revised
55 Statutes.
56

57 **NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF**
58 **BRANSON, MISSOURI, THE FOLLOWING:**
59

60 Section 1: It is the intention of the Board, and it is hereby ordained, that the provisions of this ordinance
61 shall become and be made a part of the Branson Municipal Code, and the sections of this
62 ordinance may be renumbered to accomplish such intention.
63

64 Section 2: That Chapter 58, Article I – *In General*; Chapter 58 – Article X – *Communicable Disease*;
65 Section 58-1 – *Definitions*; Section 58-386 –*Purpose*; Section 58-387 – *Personal Conduct*
66 *Prohibited*; Section 58-388 – *Operation of Public Spaces*; Section 58-389 –*Signage*, Section
67 *58-390 - Penalties* of the Branson Municipal Code are hereby amended or added to read as
68 follows:
69

70 **ARTICLE I. – IN GENERAL**

71 **Sec. 58-1 – Definitions.**
72

73 **Public space means for purposes of this Chapter an indoor or outdoor area to which the public is**
74 **invited or in which the public is permitted, including but not limited to, banks, convention facilities,**
75 **common areas, promenades, shopping malls, common areas of hotels and motels, laundromats,**
76 **museums, reception areas, restaurants, retail establishments, retail stores, schools, spas, sports arenas,**
77 **theaters, waiting rooms, amusement parks, attractions, and any place where food is prepared or**
78 **stored.**
79

80 **Face covering means a particulate mask or fabric covering of the nose and mouth secured to the face**
81 **with ties, loops or elastic that is covering the nose and mouth.**
82

83 **ARTICLE X- COMMUNICABLE DISEASE**
84

85 **Sec. 58-386 – Purpose**
86

87 **This article is enacted to mandate restrictions on conduct to prevent the introduction and spread of**
88 **contagious diseases in the City by requiring face coverings and encouraging social distancing amongst**
89 **persons in the City.**
90

91 **Sec. 58-387 – Personal Conduct Prohibited**
92

93 **Except as otherwise provided in this Article, it is unlawful for any person to be in a public space**
94 **without wearing a face covering subject to the following exceptions:**
95

96 **(1) Children under the age of 13;**
97

98 (2) Any person with a health condition documented by a medical professional that
99 prohibits wearing a face covering;

100
101 (3) Any person who is hearing impaired, or someone who is communicating with a
102 person who is hearing impaired, where the ability to see the mouth is essential for
103 communication;

104
105 (4) Any person who is in a public place consuming food, drink, or smoking while seated
106 and maintaining a physical distance of at least six feet from other persons who are not
107 family members or reside together, but such persons must wear a face covering while in
108 waiting areas and while walking to and from seating or other parts of the premises;

109
110 (5) Any person in the water at a swimming pool;

111
112 (6) Any person who is obtaining a service involving the head, face or nose for which
113 temporary removal of the face covering is necessary to perform the service;

114
115 (7) Any person playing a sport, exercising or using exercise equipment;

116
117 (8) Any person who is outdoors while maintaining physical distancing of at least six feet,
118 except as otherwise provided in this Article;

119
120 (9) Any person who is outdoors who is closer than six feet to family members or people
121 who they reside with;

122
123 (10) Any person performing on a fixed stage;

124
125 (11) Any person engaged in public speaking who maintains a minimum physical distance
126 of six feet from others who are not family members or who reside together;

127
128 (12) Any public safety officer engaged in an emergency situation;

129
130 (13) Any person during a wedding ceremony or while photographs of the wedding and
131 reception are taken; and

132
133 (14) Any family member of a deceased person during a funeral, interment, or memorial.

134
135 *Section 58-388 – Operation of Public Spaces*

136
137 It is unlawful for any person operating a public space to allow any person in the public space
138 who is not wearing a face covering unless that person in the public space is excepted from
139 wearing a face covering as provided in this Article.

140
141 *Section 58-389 – Signage Required for Business Operations*

142
143 (a) It shall be unlawful for any business to be open to the public unless at the points of ingress
144 and egress to the premises there is prominently displayed a sign no smaller than 8.5 inches tall
145 by 11 inches wide which shall contain the following in red lettering at least one-half inch high
146 on white background:

- 148 “1. IT IS A VIOLATION OF THE LAW TO ENTER THE PREMISES WITHOUT A
149 FACE COVERING. IF YOU DO NOT FEEL WELL PLEASE GO HOME.
150 2. PLEASE MAINTAIN AT LEAST SIX FEET (6’) OF DISTANCE BETWEEN
151 INDIVIDUALS THAT ARE NOT FAMILY MEMBERS OR DO NOT RESIDE
152 TOGETHER.”

153
154 (b) A business shall be in compliance with this Section if they display signage that has been
155 provided to the business by the City of Branson.
156

157 Section 58-390 – Penalties
158

159 (a) A person who fails to wear a face covering when wearing a face covering is required by the
160 provisions of this Article upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of \$100.00 and court costs.
161

162 (b) A person who owns, manages, operates, or otherwise controls a public place at which
163 wearing face covering is required by this Article and who fails to comply or to require
164 compliance with the provisions of this Article upon conviction shall be punishable by a fine of
165 \$100.00 and court costs.
166

167 No person shall be in violation of this subsection if such person or the place the person owns,
168 manages, operates or otherwise controls requires compliance with the provisions of this Article
169 to wear a face covering and a person that is allowed in the public space refuses to wear a face
170 covering.
171

172 (c) In addition to the fines established by this section, violation of this Article by a person who
173 owns, manages, operates, or otherwise controls a public place at which face coverings are
174 required by this Article may result in the suspension or revocation of any permit or license
175 issued to the person for the premises on which the violation occurred.
176

180 Section 3: This ordinance shall be in full force and effect at 12:01 AM on July 20, 2020 after its passage
181 by the Board of Aldermen and approval by the Mayor and remain in effect until 11:59 PM
182 August 20, 2020 at which time the Sections above will be repealed in their entirety.
